#### **Editorial**

The Halton Parish Council is a small team of volunteers who strive to protect and improve our village life for the benefit of all. We currently have eight Parish Councillors who are supported by a part time Parish Clerk.

Over the coming months we expect to lose three of our long-serving councillors who have done sterling work to support our parish. We therefore seek three new volunteers to join the team to help to continue our momentum. We can do more when we have a full team!

The Parish Council met recently to plan our activities and priorities.

In the past couple of years, the Council has delivered one large-scale Community Event per annum: 2021 -The Post Covid Party and 2022 - The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Village Fete and party. This year we had hoped to hold Open Gardens, an event traditionally run by a group of village residents. Sadly, there was insufficient active involvement to make the event happen.

Assuming that the Council may be a reduced team – and faces demanding challenges in the coming months (see below) - we have decided that

the Parish Council's role will be to deliver community events for national celebrations only. However, we will provide support to any residents who would like to deliver events open to all parishioners; please read Ann Jimson's article for more details.

The Council has prioritised the following core Parish issues as our focus for 2023/24:

**Closure of RAF Halton:** Continue to work with Buckinghamshire Council and the Defence Infrastructure Organisation to deliver the best outcome for our Community.

**Neighbourhood Plan:** Continue our work to deliver a suitable Neighbourhood Plan for Halton Parish.

**Communications:** Deliver a new user friendly and informative community website that links with our social media platforms and to improve the quality of the information on our village notice boards.

**Highways:** Obtain funding and support from Buckinghamshire Council to make our roads safer — particularly Halton Lane and Perch Bridge. Support RAF Halton with its efforts to reduce the speed limit on the B4009 from Mansion Hill to Main Point.

**Environment:** Conduct a Street Lighting Review. Our lampposts are of variable quality and age, and we need a suitable policy to guide viable, environmentally sustainable replacements. We aim to save energy, whilst protecting night flying insects and improve safety for pedestrians. Work with Buckinghamshire Council to install an Electrical Vehicle Charging Point in the Village Hall car park, to support residents who may have, or wish to change to, electric vehicles.

**Village Hall:** Deliver various improvements to this core village facility. We want to increase community use of the Hall (see Ann Jimson's article). We will source a new Village Hall sign to commemorate the

Coronation (we have secured funding from the Community Board for this project). Obtain funding to make necessary repairs to the front of the Hall. Renovate the rear arched window to prevent further degradation. Redecorate the exterior of the building.

#### **Highways Report**

On 10 July there was another accident on the sharp bend by the tennis club exit in Halton Lane. Exactly what happened is unclear. A car and truck hit each other, resulting in both vehicles leaving the road. The police, RAF police and two ambulances attended. Luckily no one was seriously hurt. This brings the number of accidents in Halton Lane to six this year. The parish council has sent a full report of the accidents we are aware of since January 2022 to Buckinghamshire Council asking for them, once again, to look into what can be done to make this stretch of road safer.

Vegetation has grown very quickly this year. Please remember if vegetation from your land encroaches onto the pavement it is your responsibility to cut it back, this includes trees and bushes. A big 'thank you' to those of you who have already done this.

Our MVAS continue to provide data on traffic speeds and volumes. The average speed recorded on both signs is 34 mph. We still have speeders but not as many as in previous months.

Please remember you can use FixMyStreet to report any problems you see requiring attention: potholes, overhanging vegetation, damaged pavements, streetlights not working etc.

In the London boroughs it is illegal to park on the pavement, even with one wheel. Although it isn't illegal here yet, it is inconsiderate to park on the pavement. Not only does parking on the pavement make it difficult for people walking, especially if they have a pushchair or mobility issues, it also has the potential to damage the pavement. A damaged pavement is then a hazard to everyone. If you see visitors to the village parking on the pavement please politely ask them to consider others when they park. If you do park on the village roads please ensure you are not in a location which obscures the view of other drivers or makes passing you unsafe.

Whenever there is heavy rain it causes flooding on the B4009 making the footpath between Rosemead/Mansion Hill and Chestnut Avenue impassable without getting soaked by passing traffic. We have asked Buckinghamshire Council to address the flooding issue before the autumn. Our Local Area Technician has promised to send a team to clear all the drains and investigate the system by mid-August. We will update you when the work has been completed.

# Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) for the RAF Halton Estate allocated in the Vale of Aylesbury Plan (VALP)

Following on from the article in our May newsletter, the Parish Council (as a statutory consultee) attended a meeting with the Buckinghamshire Council SPD Team and our Buckinghamshire Councillors, Peter Strachan, Richard Newcombe and Steve Bowles. The SPD Team briefed us on their progress, which confirmed that the preferred proposed site for the new (second) combined school, will be on the current site of the Sergeant's Mess. The school will not go beyond the current footprint of the Sergeant's Mess and it will be single storey to reduce the impact on the historic parkland.

The proposal for Kermode Hall is a mix of apartments (possibly a retirement complex), and a parade of shops, incorporating a Supermarket Express, and Pharmacy all adjacent to St George's Church, which will be retained as a community space. This will put the local amenities in the heart of the Parish between the village and the new development.

There will be a public consultation beginning sometime in September. When we have the details we will publish them on the Halton Hub, and we will send a notice to every household. Please take part in the consultation. It is important, and it is your chance to have your say on shaping the future of our Parish. The Buckinghamshire SPD Team is keen to hear your thoughts and ideas. They will evaluate and act on your feedback to complete the SPD, which will form the Masterplan that guides future Developers.

Just to remind you that the SPD consultation covers the area allocated in the VALP— the last Local Plan— and addressed one thousand homes which aligned to the existing building footprint and volume, as it is all located in the Green Belt. Consequently, the future of the airfield is not covered by this consultation.

# What is a Village Hall?

...a community facility that is available to the public in a particular area for community-related recreational activities...





You probably know that we have a village hall in Halton, owned and run as a mostly self sustaining building, by the Parish Council. At the turn of the twentieth century it was the village school, (seen on the left side of the black and white photo above) catering for the children of the estate workers living on the Halton Rothschild estate. When the estate was sold off in the early 1900s it came into the ownership of the parish council who later converted it into a hall to be used by the villagers for recreational activities

Over the years it has been updated, refurbished and modernised whilst preserving many of the original features.





Currently the hall is used at least twice on each weekday for activities such as yoga, pilates, personal training, art, model making, Kung Fu, Sewing and educational tuition.

In the future, the management committee is hoping that some of the social activities which used to be organised by local residents could be revived to help rebuild our community vibe. There are so many new families in the village giving the opportunity for new friendships to be made.

The hall is available free of charge for events which are open to all villagers, their friends and families.

Perhaps you and a few friends would consider organising an event in the hall? Some ideas might be a quiz, a wine tasting evening, craft days (practical or displays), performances, tea parties, pub night, a games evening, a race night, fun for children, etc.

I'm sure there is lots of talent out there, so why not join with friends and get your thinking caps on. I'm very happy to be contacted for information about what is available in the hall or anything else you may be concerned about, and more than happy to discuss any ideas.

So let's see if we could use our hall for some new community-related recreational activities!

# **Wildflower Verges**

The wildflower verges that we planted up last autumn, have started to be appreciated by the local insect population. Several of the plants have bloomed this year. The others will take longer to establish themselves. Most noticeable has been the profusion of yellow rattle which, being parasitic on grasses, should inhibit their growth, allowing the other plants to flower and increase in number.

In the verge where it is most evident, in front of Red Roof, the yellow rattle has already reduced the height of the grasses when compared to their height by the bus shelter.

The verges still have a few plants that are flowering but once they have all dropped their seed they will be strimmed and the cuttings removed to prevent enriching the soil. The less nutritious the soil, the less grass growth will occur, enabling the wildflowers to spread.

Thanks again to all the residents who helped to plant up the verges. We will be adding further wildflower seed and, especially yellow rattle, to them all in the autumn and look forward to witnessing how they develop during the next few years.
